## School Board and High School Referendum on April 1 Ballot

On April 1, district residents will head to the polls to cast their vote on the High School Facilities Referendum. This referendum project, at a cost of \$45,600,000, includes the constructing and equipping of a new high school facility; the demolishing of a portion of the existing high school facility; the renovating of the District administrative office, auditorium and music facilities at the existing high school; and the relocating and upgrading of certain existing athletic fields.

Residents will also cast their vote for three school board seats. A sample of the ballot for both school board and the referendum appear below.

# Congratulations to Bonnie Ames

## “Herb Kohl Scholarship Recipient”

Whenever students or staff earn an award, win a trophy, or accomplish a significant goal, it is exciting and healthy to share those successes with our community. We are excited and proud to announce that Ms. Bonnie Ames, 30-year veteran Language Arts teacher at Jefferson Middle School, is a recipient of the Kohl Teacher Fellowship Award for 2008.

The Herb Kohl Educational Foundation Fellowship Program rewards teachers who have demonstrated superior ability to inspire love of learning in their students, who have motivated others, and who have provided meritorious service both inside and outside the classroom. Since the program was established in

1990, the Foundation has awarded 1,400 Fellowships to teachers throughout Wisconsin. The 100 Kohl teachers and the 100 schools of those teachers will receive \$1,000 grants from the Kohl Teacher Fellowship Program.

To be eligible to compete for a Fellowship, teachers must be nominated by students, parents, other teachers, community members, or administrators. The application process requires each nominee to submit four letters of recommendation outlining specific examples of the teacher's skills and educational contributions, knowledge, or attributes. Additionally, the nominees are required to provide an essay response to six questions regarding their individual teaching style and classroom preparation. Local nominees' applications are then forwarded to a selection committee in each of the state's cooperative educational service agencies (CESA's). If selected, the successful nominee's application is then forwarded to a State Selection Committee.

Public school recipients of the Kohl Teacher Fellowship automatically become candidates for the Wisconsin Teacher of the Year (TOY) program. A total of four Teachers of the Year are selected from the pool of Kohl Fellowship recipients.

Bonnie was recognized, along with other student and teacher recipients, by the Herb Kohl Scholarship Foundation and Herb Kohl on March 30, at the Monona Grove High School. As noted above, a history of innovative teaching and student success must clearly be evident in order for any teacher in Wisconsin to receive such an honor and recognition. Ms. Ames

has, without a doubt, created and established a rich curriculum, full of innovative ideas and integrated studies that enhance student learning. To cite two examples, Bonnie plays a critical role in designing the 60's unit and the Holocaust unit at Jefferson Middle School. Students enjoy and benefit from Ms. Ames' teaching strategies.

Bonnie has been teaching in our community for three plus decades and for those of you who do not know her, she has an energetic approach and enthusiasm for student learning that is outstanding.

Past district recipients of this prestigious award include: Rich Herbst, Middle School technology instructor; Nona Schrader, Middle School language arts instructor; Arn Chamberlain, High School science instructor; and Anita Koehler, former High School guidance counselor.

Ms. Ames is a very deserving recipient of this award, and the School District is extremely proud of her accomplishments and contributions to the students of our community.

## Read Across America - 2008 "Books are Magical"

This year at East Elementary School, the theme for the *Read Across America* celebration was "**Books Are Magical.**" The goal this year was to have all students at East Elementary read, or be read to, **at home** for at least 60 minutes over one week's time. That is less than 10 minutes a day! Students reaching that goal received a small prize at the end of the week.

On Friday, February 29, the celebration was kicked off with an assembly called, "The Magic of Books." Rick Allen, a magician, combined magic with the message that reading is a life skill, that it is fun, and the more you read the better reader you become. Mr. Allen, together with student volunteers, gave a magnificent magical performance and helped to emphasize the importance of reading.

## Little Shop of Horrors is coming to JHS Performing Arts Center

A flesh-eating plant (voiced by Jacob Wirth), a nerdy florist named Seymour (played by Cyle Koehler), and six doo-wop singing teen "street urchins" (Roxi Bluhm, Sis Buroker, Katie Chmielewski, Hannah Erdman, Lauren Gruennert, and Jordan Halkoski) are among the many characters in *Little Shop of Horrors*, a musical which will take the stage April 24 through 27, produced by the JHS Eagle Theatre Council.

*Little Shop of Horrors* is a musical black comedy. Until now, more traditional musicals such as *Once Upon a Mattress* (2002), *Oklahoma!* (2004), and *Bye Bye Birdie* (2006) have graced JHS's theatre. This year, the directing staff wanted a more non-traditional choice. Director Ryan Clarksen states: "In selecting 'Little Shop' the directing staff was looking for something that broke from the traditional musical mold that we've been using for the recent past, providing the actors with a different challenge." *Little Shop of Horrors* includes rock and roll music, quirky characters, and the opportunity for students to operate and/or interact with four different incarnations of Audrey II, the plant with humble beginnings which eventually

becomes a flesh-eating monster. These elements definitely combine to create unique opportunities for the actors and crew.

Clarksen continues: "We also wanted a show that would showcase the singing and dancing talent that we have, especially the large number of females in our talent pool." For example, the street urchins are female characters based on the girl groups of the 1960s (such as the Supremes and the Shangri-Las). Together, these six introduce and comment on the action through doo-wop songs and fun choreography. In addition to these characters, *Little Shop of Horrors* provides other unique opportunities for both male and female actors, singers, and dancers. These include Mushnik, the owner of the flower shop, played by Alyssa DeJong; Audrey, Seymour's love interest, played by Tirzah Blair; Orin, Audrey's dentist boyfriend, played by Sam Koehler; and the radio announcer, voiced by Eric Beccue. In addition, the chorus includes Carlos Avalos, Jessica Avalos, Bridget Babcock, Kristi Bare, Natalie Emmerich, Moriah Guy, Ashley Hain, Meghan Ledwitch, Kait Piechocki, Lisa Preston, Katie Prosser, Keely Rauckman, and Carrie Wojcik.

"Finally, we wanted a show that had strong name-recognition and might be one that would interest people in the community," adds Clarksen. *Little Shop of Horrors* has music by Alan Menken and lyrics by Howard Ashman, the musical team who created *The Little Mermaid*, *Aladdin*, and *Beauty and the Beast*. *Little Shop of Horrors* premiered off-Broadway in 1982 and ran through 1987. At the time it closed, it became the highest-grossing production in off-Broadway history. This was followed by the 1986 movie version directed by Frank Oz (of Muppets fame). The movie starred Rick Moranis, Ellen Greene, Vincent Gardenia and Steve Martin and featured the voice of Levi Stubbs as Audrey II. Most recently, *Little Shop of Horrors* was revived on Broadway in 2003. In addition, the musical style of *Little Shop of Horrors* is similar to that of *Hairspray*, the summer 2007 hit movie also set in the early 1960's.

Jefferson High School's production of *Little Shop of Horrors* will be performed on April 24, 25, and 26 at 7:00 p.m., and on April 27 at 2:00 p.m., in the JHS Performing

Arts Center. Advance tickets may be purchased at Astell's Best Little Hair House, Bon Ton Bakery, the Council for the Performing Arts, Dave's Piggly Wiggly, Frank's County Market, and the JHS office. Advance ticket prices are \$6 for adults and \$4 for students/senior citizens. At the door, prices will be \$7 for adults and \$5 for students/senior citizens.

One such subject is world languages. Currently, less than half of American high
