## School Board Candidacy

Have you ever considered running for a vacant seat on the school board? With the spring election a few short months away, I thought it appropriate to provide an overview of the role of a school board member and the responsibilities that come with this elected position.

As elected representatives of the school district, school board members have the general responsibility of managing and supervising the district. Major areas of responsibility for these elected positions are: student achievement, policy making, evaluation, board-administrator relations, the budget, public relations, and political relations. Also, one of the most important roles that a school board has is that of advocating for children and making decisions based on what is in their best educational interest.

The National School Boards Association has identified the following as key activities school boards engage in as they strive to improve student achievement—the ultimate goal of board service:

- Creating a vision of learning;
- Establishing standards for performance;
- Creating the proper assessment system;
- Being accountable to state authorities and the community;
- Aligning the district by harnessing needed resources;
- Creating the proper climate for learning;
- Engaging in collaborative relationships with community groups; and
- Supporting continuous improvement in student achievement.

These goals should be kept in the forefront as you define your candidacy and, if elected, in your approach to your new responsibilities.

A potential candidate for school board must be an eligible elector of the district and must be: (1) A citizen of the United States, (2) 18 years of age or older, and (3) A resident of the district for at least 10 days preceding the election.

The scheduled spring election will be held on April 7, 2009. On this election date school board vacancies will be filled. If you are interested in becoming a candidate, please keep in mind the following timeline:

- 12/26/08: Deadline for Incumbent Notification of Non-candidacy
- 1/6/09: Filing of Declaration of Candidacy (5:00 p.m.)
- 2/17/09: Spring Primary (if needed)
- 4/7/09: Spring Election
- 4/27/09: Board Members Take Office

The following Board members' terms will expire in April 2009: Duane Anderson, Gary Thompson, and Ellen Saelens. The areas of representation for the open board seats include one seat for the City of Jefferson, one seat

for the district at-large, and one seat for the Towns of Aztalan, Farmington, Hebron, Jefferson, and Oakland.

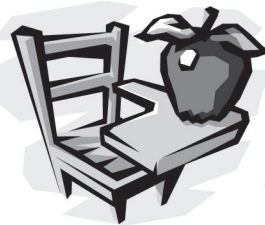

# Mass Media Course Offered at JHS

"I found it on the internet, so it must be true."

As a high school English teacher, I can attest to the fact that this reasoning appears valid to many of my students. But in Mass Media, a class offered to juniors and seniors at Jefferson High School (JHS), we delve into this statement further. As the title suggests, this English elective explores print, electronic, and broadcast media, and the effect it has on American culture and thought. This class moves away from novels and plays and focuses on media students actually use.

In this electronic age where viewers are bombarded with 24 hour news coverage, satirical newscasts, and conglomerate ownership across the industry, students learn to distinguish between fact and opinion in newspapers, magazines, web sites, and television.



They evaluate the usefulness and credibility of data and sources by analyzing each medium, determining bias, position, expertise, adequacy, validity, and reliability. They investigate advertising and the devices used to persuade the public, including the ethical issues in selling an image. The class targets two audiences: those serious about a prospective career in media and those looking for an English class more applicable to their daily lives.

At the end of each unit, students have the opportunity to produce their own media and present it to the class. After examining current issues of their favorite publications and books,

students design their own newspapers and magazines. They create article titles, a target market, and marketing proposals for their own publications. With the help of librarian Ms. Cheryl Kenders, they will have the option to write, direct, and star in their own movie during second semester.

Maybe Mass Media will encourage the next J.K. Rowling or Martin Scorsese to make his masterpiece, or at the very least, he can upload it onto "You Tube."

## Giving Back to Jefferson Middle School

As part of the Character in Action Advisory Program at Jefferson Middle School, student advisory groups participate in Service Learning Projects. The eighth grade groups choose their own projects to complete during the school year. On the day of planting, everyone worked together to dig the hole, taking turns with four shovels. With the help of Mr. Zastrow, school custodian, the students tethered the young Maple to keep it safe throughout the windy fall and winter. Other students continue to water the tree, giving up part of their lunch each day to haul gallons of water outside to keep the tree alive.

The weather has cooperated since planting day, and now the students look forward to watching the new leaves grow in the spring. They will easily be able to keep an eye on their project throughout the winter and into spring because they planted the tree on the south side of the building, with a clear view from their classroom window.

## Caring:

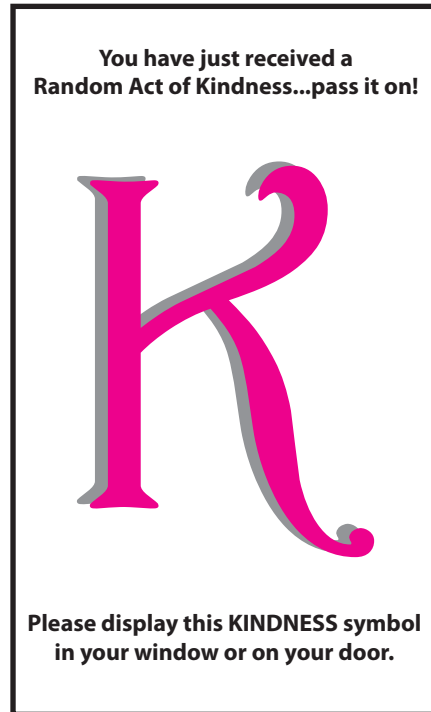
## Random Acts of Kindness

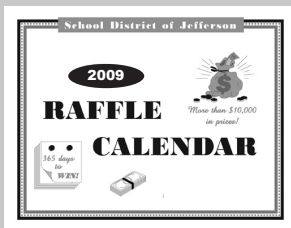
Random Acts of Kindness can be simple things:
