Food Service News

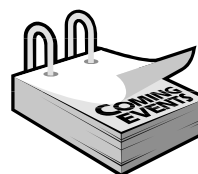

In recognition of Dental Health Month, Mrs. Maas' Kindergarten class welcomed Dr. Brian Turley on February 21. During his visit, Dr. Turley spoke to the students on the importance of good dental hygiene. The students learned the importance of brushing their teeth two times a day and to also floss between their teeth. Dr. Turley also stressed that eating healthy foods helps to maintain a healthy smile. Consuming large amounts of sugar can cause the teeth to form cavities.

To help demonstrate proper brushing and flossing, he asked for audience participation. Grade 5 Studies Checkbook Unit

Upon their return from Christmas break, the students in Mrs. Schneller's fifth grade classroom recently participated in a six-week checkbook unit. At the onset of the unit, each student started with a \$100 balance in their checkbook. In addition, each student received \$50 in cash (fake of course). After discussing the guidelines for this unit, the students then began managing their checkbooks, including depositing and withdrawing money. Some examples of expenditures were having to pay a weekly locker and desk rental fee, fines for homework not completed, a name not on a paper, and/or inappropriate behavior.

To assist with "deposit money," the students earned a weekly allowance and had numerous opportunities to pick from the "Caught Being Good Jar." This jar contained tickets for certain rewards as well as tickets worth various cash amounts. During this six-week unit, the students were actively engaged in utilizing math skills and learning responsibility and organizational skills.

At the completion of the checkbook unit, a "Market Day" was held. This was an opportunity for the students and teacher to buy and sell items for "fake" money. Depending on how much money a student had left at the end of the unit determined how much money they had to purchase items.

This unit proved to be an excellent money-handling activity. Students received exposure to how the real world works in terms of money, as well as the level of responsibility that comes with having your own checkbook.

Carrots, Anyone?

As part of their integrated science, math, and language arts programming this spring, the students in Mrs. Lea’s grades 2/3 multiage classroom will be taking part in a carrot growing activity.

But it won’t just be watching their plants grow! These students are first going to research what type of soil carrots grow best in, and then create it from a variety of planting materials right in the classroom. Once the soil has been prepared, they will read up on the best methods to grow the carrot seeds, learning about such things as taking care to use proper drainage methods,

what amounts of water and sunlight are necessary for their plants, as well as transplanting techniques once the seedlings are large enough to go in a regular garden. All of this, of course, will be carefully recorded in mini-books that the students design and illustrate to show their plants’ growth (or lack of it!) The students will choose from either writing up their results in a more scientific format, or creating their own non-fiction storybook out of this process. Charts and graphs will also be included to record waterings and growth.

Stop by Room #6 at West Elementary during the next few weeks to check out our plant progress and to see how our experiments are going!

Eighth Grade Dance Scheduled

The annual eighth grade dance will be Friday, May 12, 2006, from 7:00-10:00 p.m., at the Jefferson Middle School. Eighth grade students from Jefferson Middle School, St. John’s Lutheran School, St. John the Baptist Catholic School, and St. Peter’s Lutheran School in Helenville may attend the dance. Many of the students from these four schools will spend their high school experience together. This dance will afford them an opportunity to meet and get acquainted.

Tickets will cost \$7.00 per person and will be available a week or so prior to the dance. The eighth graders look forward to this event each year, so every effort will be made to make sure the dance is both fun and affordable for everyone. As you and your son/daughter make plans for the dance, please keep in mind that school rules will be enforced. We ask that students dress appropriately for a semi-formal dance. Appropriate attire for girls would include: dresses or skirts and tops (**no formal prom dresses**). Revealing clothing will also not be allowed. Boys are to wear slacks, collared shirts, and dress shoes. Again, in the spirit of affordability and age appropriateness, boys are not to wear tuxedos, jeans, T-shirts, or scruffy tennis shoes.

Parents should plan to drop off their son/daughter at 7:00 p.m. at the Middle School. We ask that parents refrain from renting/using limousines. We are aware that sometimes high school students will rent a limousine or an expensive sports car for high school dances. In order to keep the Middle School dance affordable and comfortable for all families, we expect our attendees not to be transported via limousines. The wearing of prom attire and limousine rental should be reserved for a student’s high school experience.

Students should be dropped off at the doors at 7:00 p.m. and picked up promptly by 10:00 p.m. Students must remain at the dance until 10:00 p.m. unless leaving with his/her parents. Parents are welcome to observe and take pictures during the first and last 10-15 minutes of the dance.

Students are expected to be in school all day the day of the dance. If students have haircut or nail appointments, or any other last minute preparations for the dance, we expect that this be taken care of outside of school hours.

Teens Teaching Teens

Teens Teaching Teens (3T's) is a cross-aged peer education class in which students are trained to implement an alcohol and other drug (AOD) prevention curriculum with the elementary, middle, and high school students. Students are selected through an extensive procedure involving nominations from the faculty.

These peer teachers are involved in an eight-week training program that prepares them to implement the lessons initially at the elementary schools, followed by the high school curriculum, and finishing at the middle level. As these students are involved in teaching lessons, they are also involved in leadership roles throughout the high school. Other activities that they are involved in are developing large group assembly programs and writing for grants to help bring programs to the high school that bring awareness of the dangers of high risk choices as a young adult.

Some of the goals of this program are to increase the knowledge of the dangerous effects of AOD use, increased knowledge of decision making steps, increased awareness of influences on decisions, heightened awareness of self and others, increased ability to resist peer pressure, increased self-confidence, and develop positive refusal skills.

The 3T's program offers credible, positive, and disciplined role models for younger children and for their peers. The 3T's program not only helps the younger students, but also brings many rewarding benefits to the peer teachers who are involved. One of the goals for this year's group was to write an AODA grant and use the money to sponsor an alcohol and drug free activity in the spring of the year. The group recently found out that they had once again been awarded a grant through CESA 2. This year's 3T members include the following high school students: Bill Becker, Ashley Blakey, Ryan Foss, Bryant Ganser, Amber Hemp, Marta Kinsman, Cassandra Kramer, Tom Nevins, Kayla Oschmann, Trent Probst, Brian Wendt,

Hosts "My Voice Can Make a Difference Week"

Throughout the entire initiative thus far, we have been blessed to have the support of our business community. Local businesses (and their corporate affiliates) have contributed time, money, in-kind materials

Our posters, this newsletter, classroom materials, conference expenses, and fun activities have been provided by our business community and others. Unique to our initiative is the involvement of our faith community. Two local pastors serve on the Community Action Team and help promote the initiative throughout other churches in our district. Because this is a “community” project, we invited the local parochial schools to participate. Their administration and teaching staff work along side ours to promote strong character.

As you can see, and hopefully you agree, Character in Action is going strong in the communities of Jefferson, Helenville, Rome, and Sullivan. Your opinion and involvement is ALWAYS welcome. Please consider becoming involved in one of the many ways available, such as: Adopting a classroom next school year or serving on the Community Action Team (which meets monthly), or best of all, by being a positive role model of good character at home, at work, at church, at the grocery store, and whenever you attend a sporting event (both home and away). Remember, our kids watch what we do more than they listen to what we say.

Ways to Promote Citizenship at Home or at Work

- Talk to your child about behaving

properly during the National Anthem and Pledge of Allegiance and remember to do so yourself. Show and explain to them what is expected.

- Show respect to persons who are serving in the military.
- Volunteer as a family to help clean up one of the local parks or a neighbor’s yard.
- Talk about the names of prominent elected officials in our community. Discuss what each position is, the qualifications that person needed to have the position, and how important it is for everyone to become involved.
- Discuss what “littering” has to do with citizenship. Encourage family members and co-workers to pick up litter when they see it.
- Identify and help solve a problem in our community.
- Purchase a flag and hang it outside.
- Discuss the meaning of Memorial Day, why we celebrate, what it is, etc.
- As an employer, have a little fun with your employees and have an essay writing contest about being a good citizen. Award small prizes.
- Identify personal “American Heroes.” Discuss why this person is a hero to you.

The point of all of this is that parents, caregivers, and employers MUST make being a person of good character important and stress it every day by what we do and say. We are all role models for one another.
